Neighbourly


Connecting neighbours and promoting community development

After less than five months and over 50,000 address verified members, the Neighbourly team has seen countless examples of how the tool leads to connections in the 'real world'. Neighbourly's co-founder Casey Eden says, "We created Neighbourly as a way to reengage people in their neighbourhoods. It's a privilege to be a part of inspiring thousands of residents to connect with others in their locality for the very first time."

Inspiring Communities Plans.

With neighbourhood strengthening now identified as key strategic priority for Inspiring Communities, we've been working on an action plan to add-value to change efforts already underway. Built around themes and ideas from stakeholder neighbourhood conversations held during 2014, our Inspiring Neighbourhoods Plan includes a number of collaborative projects that are currently being explored with a range of potential partners and funders. They include:

- New action-research on the role of primary schools as neighbourhood hubs.
- 'Neighbourhood Bootcamp' weekends in mid 2015 to support, grow and connect leaders from diverse NZ neighbourhoods.
- Inspiring Neighbourhood stories capturing and communicating practical stories and examples of neighbourhoods leading change through out NZ.
- Master-classes to build skills and capacity of those working directly in local neighbourhoods.
- Revamping neighbourhood focused resources and tools on the Inspiring Communities website.
- A resource for funders on strengthening neighbourhoods, including matched funding models and case studies of innovative practice and learning.
- A NZ Neighbourhoods Conference in 2016 to brings together all the various places, agencies, people and initiatives focusing on neighbourhood scale planning and action.
