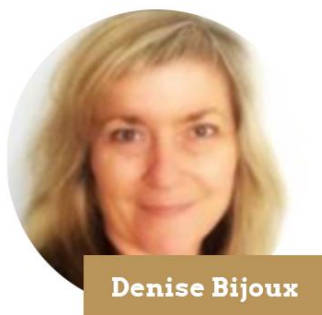
This workshop will help you:
