Come and hear stories from community initiatives working in Child Rich ways, including **Bays in Action Think Tank**, **Healthy Families Waitākere** and **Communities Feeding Communities**.

The **Bays in Action Think Tank** was established as a community-led collective to explore strength-based solutions to youth violence and bullying.

The partnership project between ANCAD and Heart of the Bays evolved into a collective of community members, community agencies, local businesses and local government.

TāfesiLafa'i is a community of care which has created a space for Aoga Amata (Samoan ECEs) to come together, connect, share and grow confidence in weaving Samoan cultural values, practices and beliefs into educational practice for the benefit of children and their families.

The project was initiated in 2020 and has operated with the support of the **Healthy Families Waitākere** since its inception.



The goal of the **Child Rich Communities** (CRC) project is to grow a network of people and projects working in community-led ways to improve the wellbeing of tamariki, rangatahi, whānau and communities across Aotearoa.
