





Former Prime Minister and Waihi Beach local Helen Clark will officially launch Sustainable Waihi Beach as its ambassador next month.

Sustainable Waihi Beach (SWB) founder Pippa Coombes said she was thrilled that Clark agreed to be the organisation's ambassador.

"We applaud Helen's commitment to and passion for sustainability, and to have someone of Helen's calibre as our ambassador provides us with real gravitas," Coombes said.

The SWB team of volunteers have been working to get the organisation up-and-running and to complete its first project – seven water stations where people can refill their reusable water bottles, helping to create a plastic-free community.

Waihī Beach waves goodbye to plastic

Waihī Beach is making significant strides in sustainability by reducing plastic waste, according to Sustainable Waihī Beach co-ordinator Pip Coombes.

"Two years after the launch of Sustainable Waihī Beach by Rt Hon Helen Clark, the community has achieved remarkable progress," Coombes noted.

A key achievement has been the installation of 11 water refill stations, funded by the Packaging Forum and the Western Bay of Plenty Council, which has prevented over 85,000 single-use plastic bottles from ending up in landfills.

These refill stations stretch from the North End to Anzac Bay, and the initiative aims to educate and encourage the community to utilise them.

To enhance accessibility, two wheelchair-friendly refill stations have been added: one at the North End near accessible beach mats and picnic tables, and another at Island View Playground.

Helen Clark has commended the efforts.

The Community Beach Clean Pods are helping to keep beaches clean.


The new Comunity Beach Clean Pods in Waihi Beach are being used daily.

Last month Sustainable Waihi Beach launched the new system to help keep local beaches and bays litter-free.

The idea evolved after Sustainable Waihi Beach's beach cleans turned up shocking results - more than 112kg of rubbish was removed at Anzac Bay and the North End. The idea is for the public to have an easy-to-use system where they can independently clean their beach areas.

The system of pods is installed at North End (two), Brighton Reserve, Tuna Ave and Anzac Bay. They are designed to hold two 15-litre buckets positioned near public rubbish bins.

Members of the public are encouraged to collect a bucket and undertake an independent beach clean, pop the rubbish into the adjacent bin and the bucket back into the pod.
